Sermon Notes:

DEFINITION OF GOOD AND BAD

- Good is a pretty subjective word. What constitutes a good meal to you? A good day? A good vacation?
- What makes something bad? There are societal norms. In other cases, something is bad if it doesn't meet personal expectations.
- We often take this definition of good and bad and apply it to our relationship with God.
- Nowhere does God promise a perfect life. But everywhere, God promises to be with us.

BACKGROUND OF PASSAGE

- To explain where we are: Abraham and Sarah had Isaac who married Rebecca...and they had Jacob and Esau. Jacob married Leah and Rachel. They (and their maids) produced several children—twelve sons and many daughters—but his favorite was the first-born son of Rachel...named Joseph.
- He treated Joseph better than he did his other sons, evidenced by the fact he gave Joseph a coat of long sleeves.
- His brothers hated him and sold him into slavery
- Joseph eventually ended up in jail. The Lord was with him.
- Two years later, Joseph was free from prison and put in charge of preparing for the impending famine

FOR US TODAY

- Joseph remains humble throughout the good and the bad.
- He could see God as good based on His abiding presence, not based on whether he got what he wanted.
- This week, let us take Joseph's phrase—what you intended for evil, God intended for good—and apply it to our own lives. Where are we missing the goodness of the Lord because of our own bitterness? Where are we missing the goodness of the Lord because of a wrong definition?
