

What Is Lectio Divina?

The Christian form of Lectio Divina was first introduced by St. Gregory of Nyssa (c 330-395), and also encouraged by St. Benedict of Nursia (c 480-547), the founder of the Benedictine order. It's a way of developing a closer relationship with God by reflecting prayerfully on His words. In Lectio Divina, the chosen spiritual text is read four times in total, giving an opportunity to think deeply about it and respond thoughtfully.

Here's how to get started:

Prepare

Spend a few moments sitting quietly so your mind is open to hearing from God.

Lectio (Read)

The first reading is an opportunity to get to know the Scripture passage. Listen for any words or phrases that seem to jump out.

Meditatio (Reflect)

The second reading of the same passage focuses you more. Try not to analyze the passage like you would in a Bible study, but instead listen for the voice of the Holy Spirit. For example, in Psalm 46, the phrase "God is our refuge and strength" might come up in your mind. Someone else listening to the same passage may hear "Be still and know that I am God." The Holy Spirit interacts with us – what do we most need to hear?

Oratio (Respond)

After a third reading, it's time to respond. You can journal or you can respond in prayer. Staying with "God is our refuge and strength," this may lead you into a prayer of thankfulness that God provides for you and protects you, or it might lead to repentance as you realize you depend too much on things outside of God.

Contemplatio (Rest)

Spend some time in silent contemplation if possible. What is God teaching you through this passage? How will you live differently? If you do this in the morning, it's amazing how it stays with you as you drive to work, go to the grocery store, fix supper, etc...that phrase "Be still and know that I am God" may continue to work on you.
