Sermon Notes:

INTRODUCTON

- Last Week: ask for the ancient paths
- Books I recommend:
 1. *With the Word* by Warren Wiersbe
 2. *How To Read the Bible Book By Book* by Gordon Fee/Douglas Stuart
- This is an apocalyptic passage.
- Today I want to focus in on what it means to be oaks of righteousness: How do we continue to nourish ourselves over and against everything that is happening?

BACKGROUND OF PASSAGE

- In the first verse, the entire Trinity is mentioned—the Spirit, the Lord, and the Messiah. The “me” refers to Jesus.
- Mission outlined: preach the good news, heal people, free the captives, proclaim both favor and vengeance, and to comfort
- All oak trees begin as acorns

DIVINE MENTOR

- He continues...*what is true for Sequoias is also true for you and me. We have delicate root systems—more fragile than we would ever imagine—and unless we find a way to protect and nourish those roots, we too will fall.*
- *It may be in one great physical, emotional, or moral collapse, or it may be little by little gradually...killing the essence of who we are and who we would like to become.*

FOR US TODAY

- How do we nourish ourselves?
- What is our “foot traffic?”
- How do we remain oaks of righteousness even when we are weary – when we feel like we can be whipped around in the wind?
